

Kenyon's Results from the HEDS Sexual Assault Campus Climate Survey

The HEDS Sexual Assault Campus Climate Survey was deployed to all Kenyon students from January 20 to February 17, 2015. Of the 1,762 students invited to participate, 338 students completed the survey for a 19% response rate. Though the survey was completed by more than twice as many women than men (70.1% women, 28.4% men, 1.5% identified as neither a man nor woman) the distribution of respondents across classes was almost even (First-years = 23.4%, Sophomores =23.4%, Juniors=27.5%, Seniors=25.4%). More than 50 other colleges participated in the HEDS Sexual Assault Campus Climate Survey in the winter and spring of 2015.

The results of the HEDS Sexual Assault Campus Climate survey pose a challenge that is not unique but is more sensitive than that posed by most Kenyon surveys. Our goal in this reporting is to balance transparency and privacy so that data can inform policy and education while carefully protecting individual respondents. Due to the extremely sensitive nature of this survey, data needed to meet the following criteria to be published:

- 1) Representative of 0 or 6 or more students. Some cases required combining categories to meet the minimum while other cases did not allow for reporting at all.
- 2) Indicative of overall trends on campus rather than specific characteristics of an assault.
- 3) Not biasing or limiting the overall context of the data by privileging one narrative over another (e.g. the experiences of women over men).
